Message from Rev. Michelle Yates

Back in April, I preached to you about a Theology for Tidying Up physically, mentally, emotionally, intellectually, etc. I shared that in her book, "The Life Changing Magic of Tidying Up", Marie Kondo offers a metric that connects to our internal workings for deciding what to keep and what to discard.

Kondo says "the best way to choose what to keep and what to throw away is to take each item in one's hand and ask: 'Does this spark joy?' If it does, keep it. If not, dispose of it. This is not only the simplest but also the most accurate yardstick by which to judge." I unpacked that a bit to recognize that not all of us have the same understanding of the word "joy" OR have the full range of emotions available to us at each moment to experience the "joy" we are imagining that Kondo and others are talking about.

Many of us encounter these feelings around the winter holiday season, as well. We feel like the season doesn't include us because we can't turn on "the happy" or struggle to viscerally recall what that feels like.

In my April sermon I offered an alternative to Kondo's metric which also applies in our month with joy as the worship theme—"Not pain."

As we look for joy and how to share it, consider sources that hold no burden, pain, or regret. Follow the path the feels lighter, more relaxed. Activities that might make you smile to think about or are connected to a pleasant memory. For me that looks like sun shining in the window, lying in the grass, my kids blowing "wish flowers" or laughing. Follow the love!

Most of all, remember that joy is not a delirious Hallmark mountain top moment. DO NOT use that as the metric of joy. Even in our lowest moments, joy lives in us. Like hope and love, they have not left us, and never will. You are and always will be worthy of joy!

"It is not joy that makes us grateful. It is gratitude that makes us joyful."

Finance News & Notes: Lightening the Load

Dedicated and trustworthy finance volunteers are crucial to the operations of the church. Many of our current volunteers have served in their roles for years, or even decades! While they make it look easy, the workload can be great.

We have been considering a finance staff position, and were hoping to hire someone to take on some of the day-to-day tasks, leaving volunteers more time to provide oversight, planning, and policy. Alas, though, we were not able to include such a position in the 2022-23 proposed church budget.

We do hope to add such a position in the future, but meanwhile, how do we support these crucial volunteers? What happens if someone gets ill or needs surgery and can't fulfill their duties? What can we do to ensure that finance volunteers can travel, without them having to worry about whether the basic finance functions are being covered?

Our short-term solution is that we'd like to have at least TWO people who know each of the four critical finance roles: Treasurer, Finance Committee Chair, Collector, and Payroll/benefits coordinator.

Each of these jobs has a learning curve, so we'd like to get some "understudies" to work alongside the current volunteers. Are you able to help? In working with a more experienced person, you can learn a finance role to see if it might work for you, or just to help out.

These aren't jobs for everyone, and they do require a strong commitment to the church. But some of the tasks can be done from home, and if you are looking for involvement without the requirement of lots of meetings, this could be for you! Please email finance@uuroc.org for more information. •

FIAC: Social Justice Fair on June 12!



General Assembly: Portland, Oregon June 22-26

General Assembly is our denomination's annual meeting to debate and vote on governance issues, recognize those who enter/depart from leadership, and participate in challenging conversations about where our denomination is headed. First Universalist congregational delegates this year are Karen LoBracco, Jean Ott and Verdis LeVar Robinson! As active ministers, Rev. Lane-Mairead Campbell and Rev. Michelle Yates also have delegate status.

Join your delegates on Tuesday, June 21, at 6:30pm at the Drop-In Discussion to learn more and voice your opinion. We will be looking for your input on the Actions of Immediate Witness which will be posted on *UUA.org* on June 20. We also want your input on the two business resolutions up for a vote this year. If you can't make the Drop-In Discussion, please call or email your delegates.

- 1. Renewing UUA Bylaws for Theologically Grounded and Mission-Focused Governance (PDF, 2 pages) In brief, our current UUA bylaws were written for another time and place. "The bylaws need a wholesale rewrite to align our UUA governance to create a dynamic, accountable, flexible and responsive governance system for how we need to function now." This resolution asks the UUA board to do this rewrite and submit new bylaws to GA 2023 or GA 2024.
- 2. General Assembly Planning Committee (PDF, 1 page) In brief, this resolution would suspend "until further notice the membership and activities required by the bylaws of the General Assembly Planning Committee." The reasoning is that GAPC has been more focused on implementation of GA rather than governance issues. Also, "One of the guiding principles of the proposed bylaw revision is to separate the governance responsibilities of the elected Board of Trustees (and their committees) from the implementation responsibilities of the Association staff and staff volunteers."

Reproductive Action on May 12

There were other stories. Our presence in the City of Rochester is important in so many unexpected but important ways. •



PRONOUN PRACTICE

INTRODUCTION

mis·gen·der /verb/ present or past: misgendering, misgendered to refer to someone (especially a trans person) using a word, usually a pronoun, honorific, or form of address, that does not correctly reflect the gender they are.

trans-gen-der /adjective/

denoting or relating to any person whose gender differs from the gender they were assigned at birth; usually shortened to 'trans' due to multiple potential full forms.

non-bi-na-ry /adjective/

denoting or relating to any trans person who is neither a woman nor a man at all or who is not 100% a woman nor 100% a man 100% of the time. [Please note that while some nonbinary people are nonbinary trans people, some nonbinary people are not trans while they are still non-cis. These definitions are also simplified and limited to the western transgender framework and may not adequately apply to non-western, non-white, or gender variant people.]

cis-gen-der /adjective/

denoting or relating to any person whose gender matches the gender they were assigned at birth; usually shortened to 'cis'.

WHAT NOT TO ASK

Question: "What are you?" or "What are you really?"
Why Not: This is an invasive question that misses the point. A trans/non-cis person is who they say they are and is the gender they say they are. Talking to us like we're lying, pretending, or are a science experiment is disrespectful and dehumanizing.
Solution: "What are your pronouns? Mine are she/her." or "Hi, my name is Sara and I'm a woman. How about yourself?"

Question: "What's your real name?" or "What's your birth gender?" Why Not: The name provided to you is their real name. The gender they were assigned at birth is not information you need and is often just trying to learn what someone's genitalia is which is inappropriate. The gender they've told you they are is their real gender.

Solution: Just don't ask these questions!

SOME KEY LGBTQ+ TERMINOLOGY


PLEASE NOTE: Language (like gender) is fluid. These definitions were built off of multiple resources and community discussions, but they are not the end-all-be-all. People may use different terms and definitions in relation to themselves and their identity.

- **SEX** Biological characteristics, including chromosomes, internal and external sex organs, and hormonal activities. Sex is most often assigned at birth based solely on the baby's genitals.
 - Despite common misconceptions, even sex isn't binary. Examples of this may include people assigned female at birth with Y chromosomes, people assigned male at birth with a divided scrotum, or women with higher levels of testosterone than some men.
- **INTERSEX** An umbrella term for people whose biological characteristics don't fit their culture's typical definitions of male or female.
 - Intersex people make up an estimated 1.7% of the population, that's about equal to the number of people with red hair!
- **GENDER** A multi-dimensional interrelationship between a person, their body, their sense of identity, social constructs, and societal norms of behavior and presentation.
- **GENDER EXPRESSION** The ways we outwardly communicate our gender to others through things such as clothing, hairstyles, and mannerisms. Also referred to as gender presentation.
- **TRANSGENDER/TRANS** An umbrella term for people whose gender identity and/or expression differs from the sex they were assigned at birth. This does not necessitate any form of medical transition process. Trans(gender) is an adjective, someone cannot be "a trans" but they can be "a trans person".
 - Approximately 12% of American Millennials identify as transgender or gender non-conforming 2
- NON-BINARY An umbrella term for people who experience gender outside or between the binary categories of man and woman. Depending on the person, this may or may not fall within the umbrella of transgender. Related terms may include genderqueer, gender fluid, agender, and Two-Spirit (a specific cultural role within some indigenous communities).
- **CISGENDER/CIS** A person who exclusively identifies with the gender they were assigned at birth. Simply put, it's anyone who isn't trans or non-binary. This is not indicative of gender expression, sexual orientation, or biological characteristics.
- **QUEER/LGBTQIA+** Umbrella terms for people of marginalized gender identities and sexual orientations. Unless a person has specified they prefer that term, be cautious when referring to someone as queer. "Queer" has a complex history as a reclaimed slur.
- **TRANSITION** A person's process of developing and assuming a gender expression to match their gender identity. This may include some or all of the following social, medical, and surgical elements: coming out to one's family, friends, or coworkers, using a new name or pronouns, changes in clothing or hairstyle, changing one's name and/or sex on legal documents, hormone blockers or hormone replacement therapy (HRT), and Gender-Affirming Surgeries. Transitioning is different for everyone, and does not require medical or surgical elements.
- **PRONOUNS** A substitute for noun or noun phrases (such as names) that are understood within the context they are used Some gender pronouns include: they, him, her, hirself, and ze. Pronouns are not necessarily indicative of a person's gender. 56% of people under the age of 20 know someone who uses gender-neutral pronouns.
- **DEAD NAMING** The act of calling a trans person by a name they no longer use—usually the name they were given at birth. This should *never* be done without explicit and specific permission from the person being named.

TERMS TO BE CAUTIOUS WITH

- $\begin{tabular}{ll} SEX CHANGE / PRE-OP / POST-OP Terms regarding gender-affirming surgeries. Generally avoided due to oversimplifying transitioning as a before \& after surgical process that is required to "fully" transition. \\ \end{tabular}$
- **TRANSSEXUAL** An older term, usually specifying someone who has gone through hormone therapy or gender-affirming surgery. Transsexual should be used only if someone has expressed it as their preferred term.
- **CROSS-DRESSER** Someone who occasionally wears clothes and accessories associated with another sex. Cross-dressing is usually done for entertainment purposes, and is not done with the intention of permanently transitioning.
- **PASSING** The act of being perceived by others as cisgender (or another identity, such as straight- or white-passing). Avoid this term as it can imply a dishonesty/trickery or an unnecessary delineation between trans and cis people. A better term you could use, if needed, is cis-assumed.
