## Finance News: Lessons from the Dusty Heap

It has been clear for some time that the finance materials and files in both the volunteer and inner offices need to be cleared and reorganized. In July, we finally got to it! A team of Finance Committee members (Grant Fish, Brian Mumey, Kevin Parkes, and Ann Rhody) as well as Board member Jim Milch worked to get rid of the old and re-organize what stays.

Here's what I learned from that experience:

- The move to "paperless office" was definitely a smart one! The IRS requires that we keep records for 10 years. The sheer volume of paper for ten fiscal years is overwhelming! We got rid of everything prior to 2012, but that required cumbersome storage and shredding solutions. Thanks to our Treasurer, Dick Shroyer, we've been almost paperless for about 7 years now. No more paper storage or shredding needed after we hit that 10-year mark!
- Boxes stored in the boiler room will definitely become dusty. Really, really, dusty.
- Many hands really do make light work! Cleaning, sorting, and decision-making are easier with a crew.
- Finally, a powerful reminder of the impact of legacy and planned giving. We ran across a statement from the early 2000's that showed our endowment at under \$150,000. Now? It's well over a million dollars. Yes, some of that has been investment growth, and we've had some really good fiscal years when we didn't need to draw as much as we planned from the endowment. BUT the biggest factor has been major bequests from 3 individuals.

This reminder prompted me to assess my own plans. Naming the church in one's will is not a difficult thing, AND you don't have to be wealthy to make a difference. As with pledging or any other fund-raising, many people doing small things equates to BIG results.

When a future finance team looks at the records from our era, I'd love for them to be able to look back and see that I made a difference by leaving something to the church. RMM continues to lead support for farmworkers' rights. The children of farmworkers enjoy a two-week day summer camp in western NY in July. In August many of the older children attend an overnight camp that emphasizes leadership development. Other programs sponsor a women's cooking co-op, ESL classes in the winter months, and assistance to teens as they apply for higher education.

RMM's Justice Organization for Youth (JOY) will present "Theatre of the Oppressed" at our church on September 23 at 3:45 at a Fringe Event.

### Pet Proxy

Remember the first time you laid eyes on the one who would become your next animal companion? Maybe they were a rescue, or perhaps you sought out this new friend. Or were you the automatic recipient when a family member could no longer care for them. It could be you weren't considering a new pet at all, until one day it became clear how this story would go.

Think back to what you did at the beginning—you carefully selected a vet, revised your budget, bought food and toys, and chose a name! Remember all the energy, money, time and care that went into bringing a new pet into your life.

Suddenly, you're unable to care for your pet. Perhaps you can't return home for several days, or had an accident, maybe you fell ill and have been hospitalized, incapacitated, or died! No longer can you tend to the life of your pet who relies on you for everything. If you're lucky, you have someone who is ready, willing, and able to be there in your absence.

But what if you don't have someone? You're gone in an instant and hadn't planned ahead, so now what happens to your companion? All too often in these situations, people struggle frantically to find someone to take in their pet, begging friends, placing ads,

seeking no-kill shelters with that very rare vacancy. Some people choose to discard their pet outdoors and carelessly leave their survival to fate. Planning ahead can prevent such situations.

You have, however, prepared your other documents for sudden illness, or death—Living Will, Health Care Proxy, Power of Attorney, and Will, that specify who, what, when, where, and how. You put thought, money, care, time, and energy into preparing those forms. But now you are absent, and your pet is home all alone. If only you'd prepared for pet care beforehand...well, yes, you can!

A Pet Proxy is a form you can create yourself (or ask me for one). Complete a Pet Proxy for each and every one of your pets. Include your vet's contact information on the form. First, decide who you would like to be responsible for your pet in your absence. Start by asking that person's permission. If they agree, then put their info in writing on your Pet Proxy form, and have them sign it next to your signature. Your Proxy should have a copy of the signed form to take to the vet, if/when needed. Inform your vet verbally, and give them a copy to keep in your pet's records. (Note: Some vets will only honor a Pet Proxy if they have it in writing beforehand, that someone other than you is acting on your behalf). Finally, be sure to file your Pet Proxy with your other important papers. Plan in advance, prepare it in writing, before you need it.

Dignify your pet's life by preparing a Pet Proxy, just as you have with your other important documents. You already committed to caring for the life of this innocent thus far, don't stop there. This way, you can rest assured that your sweet dependent will continue to be safe and loved, should anything interrupt your daily lives together. It is worth the effort for all beings. •
