

We prepare and serve a hot evening meal, help with homework, offer a lap, a story and a hug, a listening ear, a word of encouragement, overnight presence, breakfast and whatever else might be needed before the families return to their jobs or to the Center for another day of hard work. ❖


- Ed Deller was elected to continue as congregation president for the next year.





# Auld Lang Syne

**A**T ABOUT 7:15am on Sunday, March 17th, 1935, a windstorm barreling through Rochester with winds up to 44mph demolished the two side sections of the beloved Sargent window in the back of the church. Hearing the sound of crashing glass, the church custodian, who was already in the building preparing for the morning service, had run up the stairs to the side entrance of the sanctuary and was blown over by the force of the wind rushing through the church. Only a few minutes earlier he had been standing directly underneath that window, looking at the thermometer that controlled the temperature in the sanctuary. As soon as he could manage, he summoned help, and the current and former House Committee chairs, the Board president, and the owner of the Haskins Stained Glass Studio quickly assembled to view the damage and make plans for repairs. Thankfully the center section depicting Jesus the Good Shepherd was undamaged. The April issue of *Our Outlook* issued a few weeks later reported: "Since it was impossible to hold service in our church that morning, we asked Rev. David Rhys Williams, minister of the First Unitarian Church [across the street], for the privilege of meeting in Gannett House. Mr. Williams graciously invited us to join his congregation, and insisted that Mr. Blauvelt deliver the sermon. As it was the seventh anniversary of Mr. Blauvelt's coming to Rochester, and the Rochester Chapter of the Order of De Molay was to attend our service in a body, we had an unusually large number to add to Mr. Williams' congregation. In spite of the sadness over the loss of our beautiful window it was an inspiring service, and every one of our own people went home determined to help restore the window to its original loveliness." Members were grateful that no one had been in the sanctuary during the accident. They thanked the people who had helped clean up the broken glass and particularly the three men who had worked for hours "in a piercing cold wind" to board up the window opening. Within a few days the Board arranged a contract with the Haskins studio for repairs. Some weeks later the window had been reconstructed and was then reinstalled in its accustomed place overlooking Clinton Avenue and Washington Square Park beyond it, and a service of re-dedication took place on April 28.



The window had been donated around 1901 by the wealthy locksmith and devoted Universalist James Sargent while the congregation was still meeting in its former church just two blocks north on Clinton Ave. The window's creator had taken inspiration for its design from a well-known painting by the French artist Gustave Doré known as "The Good Shepherd." ❖

### **Window Repairs**

The repairs to the stained glass window in the Clara Barton lounge are progressing. The contractor has now procured all the needed material and is in the process of building a replacement window. The new window should be installed shortly a few weeks.

### **Exterior Renovation**

The Exterior Renovation project is still on schedule and will start in late July with completion expected by early October. The church parking lot will not be available for use during this time.

### **Heating System**

The steam has been turned off and the system has cooled. Our heating contractor will be in soon to repair the three leaks.

### **Screens**

The windows in the RE wing will be fitted with screens to allow bug-less cooling for members and RAIHN guests alike. The challenge will be the curved top to the windows.

### **Mysterious Rubble**

A small pile of rubble was found at the end of the second floor hallway in front of the fire escape door. Apparently this fell from above and some ended up on the floor through a small gap in the ceiling. The material included drywall and mortar. We will continue to work on determining a cause. ❖
